

PRESIDENTS REPORT

At last week's meeting solicitor **David Crowley** was our guest speaker and he certainly gave us a lot to think about regarding the pitfalls of not having our Wills, Powers of Attorney and Enduring Guardianships in order. With a significant increase in the number of wills that are being challenged and the high cost of defending those challenges, it is incredibly important to those that we leave behind that our intentions are clear and enforceable.

As reported at our last meeting the Board has approved the introduction of breakfast meetings every second Thursday which will replace the normal dinner meetings on that day. The breakfast meetings will be held at Ken Hutt's Jetz Café from 7:00am to 8:00am with coffee and tea available from 6:45am and the first meeting will be held on 22nd August. A schedule of meetings is included elsewhere in The Bulletin.

Also approved at the recent Board meeting was the introduction of the Community Grants Program and a copy of that document was included in last week's Bulletin. This program will give members a greater involvement in the distribution to the community of the funds collected at our many fund raising events.

CENTURION PROGRAM

The Centurion Program is a District program to recognise donations of AUD \$100 to The Rotary Foundation. The donation can be made as a single payment or accumulate over the period of the Rotary year. Recognition is provided by the issuing of a Centurion pin the first year of achievement and by a certificate for ensuing years.

When a Rotarian qualifies as a Centurion, advice is provided to the District Centurion Chair who will arrange for the issuing of a pin. The only requirement is for the Club Secretary to advise the amount of AUD 100 has been remitted to the Foundation.

To assist Rotarians to save and qualify as Centurions, a Centurion Collector is available from the District Chair at no cost.

Every week, before you go to Rotary, slip \$2 into your Centurion Collector

+ take \$100 top the Club for depositing in your account or

Next month, 17 ShelterBox supporters will accompany me on the Larapinta Trek in the Northern Territory. Together, we have raised over \$46,000 and counting!




